ARES May Report

April SBARC Monthly Meeting

SBARC and ARES hosted Sgt. Tom Walton and Mitch Evans to speak on county emergency communications and amateur radio participation at its April meeting. Sgt Walton is the Sheriff Dept emergency planning coordinator, and Mitch Evans is the County network and communications manager. Each emphasized how useful amateur radio support has been, particularly through the logistical support of ARES. Hams are asked to stay prepared with backup power, supplies, action plan, etc. They are asked to join and train with ARES, or other public service agencies in their area like the American Red Cross or Salvation Army. In the event of a disaster, untrained, but well meaning people are reminded that agencies will not take spontaneous responses. So, get trained and networked now.

Orientation Manuals

Completely revised ARES Orientation Manuals were completed prior to the end of 2008 and distributed to all ARES members. This time, a new feature was added: a list of study questions. Each ARES member was asked to return these study questions. These questions covered every aspect of our activity and were very well received by all members for their review.

Van Training

The ARES Van is one of our chief assets and has numerous communications and logistic capabilities. The Van can remain on the air, via HF, VHF, UHF, as well as public service frequencies for up to three days. It also has out-board power systems that can serve us and other agencies in time of need. It serves as the hub of many of our activities. Bruce Gordon, [N6OLT](#), created a marvelous ARES Van Orientation workshop. Every system on board was described and illustrated in a Power Point presentation at the March meeting. Everyone present received a diploma, certifying his or her completion and participation. Several team members have asked to train to drive the van, and preparations are under way.

Twin Lead j-pole antenna

At the April Meeting, after discussing preliminary material we built twin lead j-pole antennas. These handy, and useful antennas can be rolled up and placed in one's "go pack", ready for service. The entire team pulled together quickly and soon an assembly line was formed quickly turning out 19 antennas in both 2-meter and 220Mhz lengths.

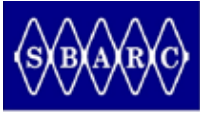

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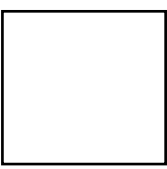
